## **OUR FOUNDER**

The Guild was set up in 1882 by Lady Wolverton who was asked by the Matron of an orphanage in Dorset to provide 24 pairs of hand knitted socks and 12 jerseys for the children. This request gave Lady Wolverton the idea of starting the Guild.

The Object of the Guild is to buy, make and collect new clothing and linen and distribute these items to British Charities operating only in the United Kingdom for the sick and needy that they support.

## A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE GUILD

In 1882 the Matron of an orphanage in Dorset asked Lady Wolverton if she could provide 24 pairs of hand knitted socks and 12 jerseys for the children. This gave Lady Wolverton the inspiration of starting a small Guild amongst friends to provide not less than two garments a year each to help the orphanage and other Charities. After a year they had attracted 460 members. In 1885 a friend of Lady Wolverton's, Her Royal Highness Princess Mary Adelaide, Duchess of Teck (mother of the future Queen Mary) became Patron of "The London Guild"; in 1889 it was re named "The London Needlework Guild".

In 1897, on the death of her mother, Her Royal Highness the Duchess of York, later Queen Mary, became Patron. Her Majesty had worked for the Guild from her early youth, leading her own Group, and the Guild was said to be her favourite Charity as it was the first one to arouse her interest. In 1914 the name was changed to "Queen Mary's Needlework Guild". As part of the war effort hundreds of thousands of garments were packed and sent to troops overseas. Queen Mary requested garments and parcels sent to Friary Court, St. James's Palace, London, where to this day we still coordinate the distribution of clothing to the UK Charities the Guild continues to help. Her Majesty was in charge during this time and there was a book printed covering the work of the Guild from 1914 – 1919. In the years between the wars the Guild provided 60,000 garments a year but the Second World War brought difficulties. Many county branches dropped out and the number of garments distributed decreased. Her Majesty, realising there was a pressing need to provide clothing for the poor, did much to re-ignite the flame. The Report for 1950 shows 14,843 garments were sent to 130 Charities.

On the death of Queen Mary, in 1953, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother became Patron, taking over Queen Mary's Group and the Guild continued to flourish producing 15,000 or more garments each year. Her Majesty was a wonderful supporter and rarely failed to attend Packing Week at St. James's Palace where she always had time to talk to knitters and Charity Representatives. In 1986 the name was changed to "Queen Mary's Clothing Guild".

In 1911 Her Royal Highness Princess Mary, later The Princess Royal, formed her own Group. After her death in 1966 this was taken over by Her Royal Highness Princess Margaret, Countess of Snowdon. In 2002 on the death of Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother and Princess Margaret, the two Groups were amalgamated and are now called The Royal Group, which regularly produces 3,000 or more garments each year.

In 2003 Her Royal Highness Princess Alexandra, the Hon Lady Ogilvy became Patron and gives wonderful support during Packing Week at St. James's Palace. On Thursday 22nd November 2007 Her Royal Highness attended a service held at The Queen's Chapel of the Savoy to celebrate the 125th Anniversary of the founding of Queen Mary's Clothing Guild.

On 29th April 2010 the name of the Guild was formally changed to "Queen Mother's Clothing Guild" after agreement from Her Majesty The Queen. This name change was made as a tribute to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother who had been our Patron for over fifty years.



## EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Annual General Meeting took place on Thursday 29th April at The Lansdowne Club, London. This was also the day that we formally changed the name of the Guild to Queen Mother's Clothing Guild. The Hon William Shawcross gave us a fascinating talk on his biography of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother, a fitting subject for the day. Everyone enjoyed the talk and it brought fond memories of our late Patron to us all.

This year we have had one resignation of a Scottish President, Elizabeth Duvill. Three new Presidents have joined; Majella Forster and Kate Trinder from London and Sally Brunning from West Sussex. The Executive Committee would like to take this opportunity to wish all three well in the running of their new Groups.

We had a call in the summer from Valerie Miller in Newcastle upon Tyne asking if there was a Group nearby where she could give some knitted clothing to. Sadly this was not the case. After several telephone calls we managed to find Praxis and The Cyreneans, two local Charities who were delighted to take on the clothing knitted by Valerie and her friends. Valerie visited both Charities and donated her garments in the name of the Guild. It is wonderful to feel that the Guild is still growing and is able to help people in the way that it was founded to do and we welcome Valerie as a new Group Leader.

There were many comments during the year on the new look Report. The feedback suggests that it's read and enjoyed by everyone and is another way of providing information to encourage new members to join. It is important that the Report gives readers a clear idea of what the Guild is all about. Last year we also produced a Christmas card and some new notelets. We are continually looking at new ways to get the Guild's name across to people who would not normally know about us.

Packing Week was held from Monday 20th to Wednesday 22nd September and was very well attended. It had a real buzz about it this year with some new faces among those of us who have always been there. Her Royal Highness Princess Alexandra visited us during View Day on the Tuesday; as usual she was wonderful and spent time making sure she spoke to most of the guests and members who attended. This was much appreciated by all.

Jane Denny who had been associated with QMCG for more years than most of us can remember sadly died in January 2011. We will miss her greatly and she will be fondly remembered for all the work she did within the Guild.

Many members over the past year have held fund raising events to promote the name of the Guild. The Executive Committee would like to thank them all and continue to encourage others to do the same, please do not hesitate to let us know if we can give you any help. As a Charity we still need to grow to provide the necessary assistance to those who are most in need of our help. On behalf of the Executive Committee I would like to thank you all for your continued hard work and support.

## ORGANISATION

The Guild is managed by an Executive Committee which meets regularly and consists of a minimum of seven Presidents including Ex-Officio members. Presidents are elected as Committee Members for three years and are not eligible for re-election, unless appointed as Officers, for a further three years. The Executive Committee publish a full report each year.

A part time secretary, who works from home, is our only paid employee. Other expenses during the year, apart from incidental running costs, are the hire of rooms for the three days of the annual Packing Week at St James's Palace and the hire of a room for the AGM, to which all Presidents and Vice Presidents are invited. Expenses are supported by annual subscriptions from Presidents paid by Standing Order, under Gift Aid if applicable, to the Hon. Treasurer.

During the year individual Groups organise functions to raise money, hold knitting parties and start to collect items that will go to St James's Palace. In the summer all the Charities on the current list and new ones that have applied are contacted by the Secretary to ask for a list of the type of clothing they would like to receive.

Warehouse shopping is done at the end of the winter when it is possible to purchase winter clothing at a good price. Charities request good quality warm items and these are expensive, we try to shop as economically as possible. The warehouses used are kind enough to hold items purchased until they can be delivered at the start of Packing Week to avoid storage costs.

All clothing and linen that has been collected arrives on the first morning of Packing Week, everything is unpacked and counted for allocation purposes before being distributed between the stalls (see page 7). During the second morning, our Patron normally attends as do members from Groups all over the UK; Charities also visit to find out how we operate with a view to receiving clothing in future years. When the guests have left, the garments are packed ready for collection by each Charity the following morning. The whole process takes two and a half to three days.

### **THE ROYAL GROUP – Daphne Clarke**

The Royal Group, through the generosity of those who made and sent items and also those who gave money to be spent at the Warehouses, donated a total of 2,532 garments this year. Thank you most sincerely for your kindness. VAT has now increased so we will have to make an even greater effort to provide essential items for those we support.

The Catholic Clothing Guild, which has always given the Guild enormous support, was invited by Her Majesty The Queen Mother to join the Royal Group in 1980. Mrs Frances Ripper, their Secretary, has now retired and Mrs Margaret Keating has been appointed Liaison Officer. I wish them both well and thank Mrs Ripper for all her work on our behalf.

The deaths of two members of the Royal Group, Mrs Aylmer and Miss Jane Denny, has saddened us all. We will remember them with love and thanks for all they did for the Guild. Let us try to emulate their selfless endeavours to help those less fortunate than us. I know that you will all continue to help in any way you can.



## THE SCHOOLS' GROUP – Rachel Parry

Students from Manor House, Downe House & Heathfield St Mary's Schools helped at Packing Week 2010. Since then they have been busy preparing for 2011.

**Manor House School, Mrs Williams:** We are keen to retain our long association with QMCG. Each year we ask parents to donate items of clothing. We also have a summer charity fund raising day. Some of the money raised is used to purchase clothes to supplement those donated. Each year our senior prefect team attend Packing Week and the AGM. They are escorted by a member of staff and afterwards they are taken out for a trip such as tea at Harrods or Fortnum and Masons. **Downe House School, Mr Savage:** Girls joined the helpers of the Queen Mother's Clothing Guild at St James's Palace. HRH Princess Alexandra spoke to each excited girl in turn and they were thrilled to have had the opportunity to meet her. The girls thoroughly enjoyed their day working at the Palace and are planning a fashion show, to showcase the work the GCSE and A Level students are working on at the moment, in order to raise money for the Guild. **Heathfield St Mary's School, Mrs Squires:** Last year the students did all manner of fundraising, even selling Krispie Kreme Donuts and toasted cheese sandwiches during morning break. A new group, including Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme Students, has started fund-raising and is also looking forward to making children's PJ's, so hopefully a cheerful looking colour scheme will be on display at Packing Week. A cheque is being prepared for £450, which we hope will buy much needed children's school uniforms and winter jackets.

The recruitment drive for more schools continues. Personal contacts are key to the process so any names would be useful. I tell all students, by helping the Guild **you really can help to change many people's lives.**

## THE CARSHALTON GROUP – Lilian Hoath

The year 2010 was an exceptionally good one for the Carshalton Group. We raised awareness of the Guild by organising coffee mornings, garden parties and giving talks to various groups including the WI, TWG, U3A and local churches. This outreach generated much interest and a number of people expressed a desire to become involved with the Guild.

Nearly 80 people were able to attend the annual View Day at St James's Palace. They were naturally delighted to meet our Patron. Many people sent letters of appreciation. Sample comments included "We were amazed at the wonderful selection of knitted garments, all so beautifully made!" "The tiny bonnets knitted by a 97 year old blind lady for neo natal units were delightful" and "the attractive and colourful knitting on the 2-5's stall was very impressive"

The three Presidents and Vice-Presidents in the Carshalton Group are a very happy team and are keenly anticipating the year ahead. In response to the charities' requests we hope to provide more school uniforms and warm outerwear. A key aim for 2011 is to recruit more new members including young people from a local girls' high school.



## THE CHISWICK GROUP – Trish Pead

After five years of being a 'helper' at Packing Week, I decided to start a group in 2009. I'm very happy to report that it has become a great success due to our 'Bring, buy and swap' days.

Throughout the year, all my friends (and friend of friends) save their unwanted fashion items clothes, shoes, handbags, costume jewellery etc. and twice a year I hold a sale at my house. I collect all the unwanted items the week before and prepare them for the sale on rails and tables, or the ladies bring them on the day.

Tickets are sold at £10 each which includes either; morning coffee and croissants, a light lunch and a glass of wine or afternoon tea and scones. The ladies take their time to browse and try on the garments and then give a fair donation for all the items they take. Everyone goes home happy, especially those who picked up a designer outfit or handbag at a fraction of the cost!

The Guild is all about giving those less fortunate something new and there's no better way than recycling our unwanted clothing in such a fun way. Last year we purchased 516 new items.

## BABIES CLOTHING STALL – Jane Tham

I have been involved with the Baby Stall for nearly 50 years, and it is only quite recently that babies clothing has changed. Today, young mothers are dressing even new born babies in miniature adult clothes and do not want matinee jackets. Tiny cardigans, jeans and fleeces, machine washable and easy care are the order of the day.

Now that knitting has once again become fashionable for all ages, perhaps those who are out of practise, and do not feel they can cope with the intricate stitches of former years, could be encouraged to knit some cot or pram blankets for babies. If after this anyone feels encouraged to become more adventurous move on to cardigans or even some embroidery. There is a remarkable lady, aged 101, who recently made six beautiful cot quilts for us.

## THE CATEGORIES OF GARMENTS AND LINEN

The new items made, donated or bought are divided into the following categories before being distributed each autumn at Packing Week.

NEONATAL – Has recently been introduced to cope with the growing demand from neonatal units, who require specialist cot linen and garments to cope with premature births. Pastel colours please.

BABIES – All babies clothing and bedding up to the age of two years. Many hand knitted items are supplied from people all over Great Britain who enjoy knitting but also has baby grows', nightwear, daywear and outdoor wear. Machine washable and easy care are required.

CHILDREN 2 - 10 years – All types of clothing, many items are hand knitted but we are frequently asked for warm outerwear, jeans and school uniforms.

CHILDREN 10 - 16 years – All types of clothing are provided, warm outerwear, tracksuits and sweat shirts are much in demand as is school uniform. Any practical hard wearing casual clothing is useful.

WOMEN 1 – All underwear and night clothing. Requests come in from hospices who require nightwear, homeless charities who require warm underwear and other charities who provide clothing to many people in need.

WOMEN 2 – All other clothing for women. Hospices and old people's homes require woollen garments that open down the front for easy care, tracksuits, warm coats and jackets but any form of daywear is much in demand.

MEN – All clothing for men, night and daywear. Hospices require mostly night clothing, homeless charities always request warm clothing in dark colours but anything is gratefully received and much needed.

LINEN – Provides sheets, pillow cases, towels and sleeping bags which are in demand for the homeless. Linen is also used by charities to help people start up in their own flats or to replace items lost in theft or fire.

VARIOUS – A collection of three stalls that deal with the following:

Various 1 – Bed jackets, knee rugs, shawls, bed socks and many other hand knitted items.

Various 2 – Adult hats, gloves and scarves.

Various 3 – Shoes and slippers for all ages

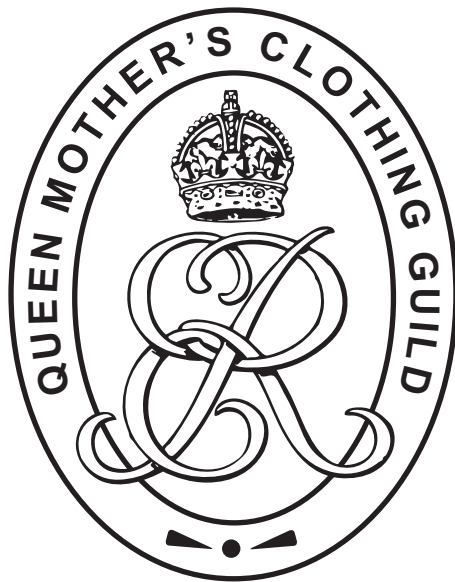
